How can I get involved in ACCFO and make a difference? Contact the community colleges that surrounds your college, if you need a name and address, visit the ACCFO website at www.ncaccfo.org and look at the list "Members by College" if you can not find a particular person, please contact Phil Harrison. Another great tactic is contacting someone outside of your district, maybe a college about the same size as yours, this way you may have more things in common.

 \bigstar Don't think about what you can get out of the relationship, what can you contribute to the other person. If you have a specific task that you are having a hard time finding a solution, maybe ask for a suggestion or a different perspective.

★ Don't be afraid of asking for help on topics that you aren't well versed in such as personnel issues or building automation systems. Being outside of your comfort zone is not a bad thing, it may help you overcome some of your doubts.

* When emailing, try to keep things short and to the point.

* Bring some personal issues into the discussion and/or email.

★ Make notes for future reference, this will help in future communications with the person.

\mathbf{x} Try to make the other person feel comfortable and at ease.

☆ Compliment the person on their knowledge of the subject matter.

 \clubsuit Be true to your word, if you tell someone you will get back with them in a couple of days; then don't wait until a month or two have passed.

x If possible, invite them to your community college so you can show them what you are talking about and they can see first hand what you did for a particular situation.

★ By expanding your contact list, you will always have someone else you can contact when trying to provide assistance to a fellow member.

x Be yourself and do what you are capable of doing. Don't promise assistance when you know you don't have the time and resources.

* Help yourself build a strong professional network and it will make you successful at your job.

★ Networking with other community colleges will benefit your department and employees. Teach them how to reach out to other trades people at other community colleges to help them in the their career growth. Example your HVAC personnel should know other HVAC personnel at other community colleges so they can benefit from their knowledge and expertise.

★ Depend on each other through open communication.

★ You have to take the initiative to start a dialogue with your fellow members.

 \bigstar If you are utilizing new technology or equipment that has cutting edge technology at your facilities, this might be something you can share with your fellow member.

 \bigstar If you know of a vendor that provides you outstanding service, share that firms name with your fellow members.

★ Do you know vendors that are on the North Carolina State Procurement website that provide equipment, products, and materials that you can recommend?

Sharing your experiences is the most important thing you can do for others.

★ Become involved in ACCFO and make a difference in another community college.

Outstanding ACCFO College

Montgomery Community College is located in Troy, NC. Tucked away in the ancient rolling Uwharrie Mountains and Uwharrie National Forest, Montgomery Community College provides an intimate campus where students are known by name and become part of the extended college family. Mont-gomery Technical Institute was chartered on September 7, 1967. In June 1968 a building on Page Street in Troy was occupied as a temporary location of Montgomery Technical Institute. In October 1971 the citizens of Montgomery County authorized the construction of a new campus of 64,000 square feet of space on a 149 acre tract of land. The campus now includes facilities of approximately 134,000 square feet on 153 acres of land with 1,074 curriculum students and 34 full time curriculum faculty members. Montgomery Community College has 129,642 square feet of space within seven buildings. They are considered a small community college compared to the other 58 community colleges.
