Charles White is Cleveland Community College's 2017 Academic Excellence Award winner.

White expects to graduate in May with an Associate in Applied Science in Electronics Engineering Technology and an Associate in Applied Science in Automation Engineering Technology. As part of his Electronics Engineering Technology training, White took and passed the exam required to earn his Certified Associate Electronics Technician (CET) certification.



White is currently employed by Duke Energy in the Power Career Intern Program.

Getting medically discharged in 2014, West decided to move back home and spend time with family and friends he had not seen in years due to deployments to Iraq and Afghanistan. Working two jobs, one as an auto mechanic and as a millwright West decided he wanted to do better for himself and his wife and enrolled at Nash Community College.

❖ The State Board of Community Colleges on July 20 approved the selection of Dr. Gregory McLeod as president of Edgecombe Community College in Tarboro.

A 17-year veteran of community colleges, McLeod is currently provost and chief campus academic officer at Thomas Nelson Community College in Virginia. He holds a doctorate in leadership and education from Barry University, a Master of Education degree in training and development from North Carolina State University and a bachelor's degree in education from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.



McLeod will begin his new post in mid-August, succeeding Mark Lorence, who has served as interim president since June 1.

❖ Dr. Lawrence Rouse will become the president of Pitt Community College on August 1.

A South Carolina native, Rouse brings more than 36 years of experience in community college administration to PCC. He joins Pitt from James Sprunt Community College, where he served as president and CEO for 13 years. PCC Trustees selected Rouse to replace the now retired G. Dennis Massey as president at the conclusion of a national search earlier this year. The State Board of Community Colleges made it official during its regularly-scheduled meeting on May 18. Rouse is only the fifth president in PCC's 57-year history, along with Lloyd Spaulding, William Fulford, Charles Russell and Massey. Pitt, which serves more than 23,000 students in credit and non-credit programs annually, is currently North Carolina's sixth-largest community college in terms of student credit hours.
